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More bicycle racks installed

One-hundred and forty bicycle racks have been installed at convenient locations on the campus.

University Police Chief Kent Butler says, "Bicycles are becoming more popular for a number of reasons and we hope the installation of these racks will be suitable for riders."

The Chief adds, "Something to remember about bicycles is that they can be fun and economical, but they must be driven with the same care and responsibility as a motorized vehicle. When on the street, a bicycle operator is obligated to obey the same laws and observe the same traffic patterns as automobiles. Bicycle users are not to ride on sidewalks. The operator should dismount the bicycle and push it if it is necessary to transit a sidewalk."

Butler says mopeds can be parked in bicycle racks. The motor should be turned off and mopeds pushed to the rack.

Motorcycles are to be parked in designated spaces in the parking

The Newport Trio is comprised of Daniel McKelway, clarinetist; Christopher Costanza, cellist and Hyunsoon Whang, pianist.

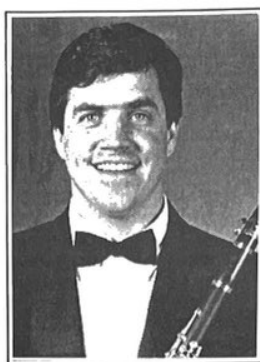
The trio's performance will include pieces by Beethoven, Schumann, Popper, Stravinsky and Brahms.

tional trade. "The key to the success of doing business with Mexico lies with knowledge," said Bill J. Brown, who helped design the seminar series and is partner/manager of Peterson Development Co. in Corpus Christi. "People will emerge from Texas A&M-Corpus Christi's program with a broad and practical base of knowledge to begin doing business with Mexico."

Spaces remain available for the seminar series, which will include nine three-hour sessions between Feb. 16 and May 18. Seminars will be taught by Texas A&M-Corpus Christi faculty as well as other university instructors and business experts. Seminar topics include economic, political and demographic trends, business customs, distribution and transportation challenges, financing, regulations, accounting practices and taxation policies in Mexico. Carlson in Texas A&M-Corpus Christi's office of University Outreach by calling 994-2778. Cost to attend all nine sessions and receive a Certificate in International Trade is \$310. Cost to attend individual seminars is \$40 per session.

The program is sponsored by Texas A&M-Corpus Christi and the Greater Corpus Christi Business Alliance Small Business Development Center. Additional support is provided by American Bank, Matthews and Branscomb and Mercantile Bank.

Intern sees the FBI from the inside

The name creates an image of efficient and sophisticated law enforcement: The Federal Bureau of Investigation. For George Krest, a computer information systems major at Texas A&M University-Corpus Christi, the FBI is more than an image after he gained an inside perspective last summer as an intern in the FBI Honors Internship Program in Washington D.C.

"This was not a 'Go get me coffee' type of internship," says Krest. "This was more like 'Show us your stuff.'" He adds, "The FBI would route you with a job in your field and major. The program was very well organized. We had the opportunity to explore the bureau, train with agents and work on real world cases going on. We were actual participants in the bureau."

On his first day as an FBI intern, Krest was given an office with his name on the plate on the desk. During the next three months he would perform software analysis to determine packages that would benefit the organization and case analysis. Krest explains, "In case analysis, I was part of a rapid start team to develop patterns and leads. We would go through phone records and reports from field agents and link them together."

Cases he worked included the World Trade Center bombing in New York City, a kidnapping and a drug

case. He also went on "ride-alongs" with field agents working bank robberies and fired automatic weapons at the firing range. "All you had to do was ask and you could do it," he recalls.

Prior to being accepted for the program, Krest and the other interns were required to go through a background check, submit to a polygraph test and take a battery of academic tests. "The FBI wants a good moral background, high academic standards and a clean-cut appearance," Krest says. "The FBI is more open than before, but you still have to mind the 'p's and q's,'" he adds.

He continues, "The bureau is looking to expand the number of minorities in their work force. They are actively recruiting females and persons with language skills. There is a diverse field of talent the FBI has also. There are people of many trades and specialties from carpenters to computer experts."

The selection process was extremely competitive for the 70 internships available. Approximately 3,000 junior and graduate students applied for the program. "Some of the people I was around were surprised to see a South Texas boy up there," says the 1986 graduate of A.C. Jones High School in Beeville. "I was the only intern from Texas. Most of the interns were from big-

ger schools." He adds, "This internship is for recruiting purposes. The FBI wants outstanding college students to come back into the program. I would like to see more people from around here apply. This experience lets you see how our government is run, gets your foot in the door and provides you with training you can include in your resume."

While Krest was using his computer knowledge in the office and in the field, one of his friends was working security for the World Cup Games. Another friend organized and hosted a forensic seminar at UCLA for scientists from all over the U.S.

During the three-month internship, Krest became recognized as a leader among the interns and was chosen to make the keynote speech at a banquet with FBI Director Louis Freeh. "The theme of my speech was to plug the internship program to the director, give an overview of the program and promote it for the future," remembers Krest.

Krest likes to say his pickup truck in Washington D.C. cast him in a leadership role among his peers, but there are stronger indicators. He is the Cadet Company Commander of the Charlie Company Javelina Battalion of the TAMU-CC ROTC, member of the National Guard, works approximately 50 hours a week as the Dispatcher Training Officer for the Corpus Christi Police Department and is carrying a full load at TAMU-CC.

According to Krest the largest influence and inspiration behind his career path is his grandfather, Thomas Grace Sr., a retired sheriff's deputy for the Nueces County Sheriff's Department. "I've always respected his perspective and views of life," says Krest. "He is what initially interested me in law enforcement."

He is quick to give credit to TAMU-CC Associate Professor of Management Dr. Elwin R. Myers. It was Myers who wrote the letter of recommendation for Krest to the FBI.

Also helping Krest stay on track and providing support is his wife, Lillie Jo, whom he married last October.

Does Krest really want a career in the FBI? "Definitely," he states. "That is my goal."

"Harvesting the Sea" event leading to links with Mexico

The Corpus Christi Hispanic Chamber of Commerce and its International Trade Committee hosted visitors from Mexico and Canada for the first ever "Harvesting the Sea" symposium in November.

At the event were 18 exhibitors from three countries including three Mexican states. Major exhibitors included Red Ewald Inc., Gulf King, Valls International, Roland Fiberglass, Southwestern Barge, Fishing Light Company, Zimco Marine, Redding Communications and PEI Trade Enterprises.

Luncheons on both days highlighted cooking presentations from both the United States and Mexico. Chef Nicolas Salcedo of "La Chata," a Guadalajara, Jalisco restaurant, presented traditional regional and national recipes. Chef Neil Wall, corporate executive chef for Speedy Food Service, a national catering company, demonstrated American seafood recipes.

Texas A&M University-Corpus Christi and its Mariculture Program, coordinated by Dr. David McKee, sponsored tours of the Gulf Coast Conservation Association/Central Power and Light Marine Development Center near Flour Bluff and Texas A&M Shrimp Mariculture Project and University of Texas Marine Science Institute, both in Port Aransas.

According to McKee, mariculture is a top economic development priority for the Mexican government. "Mexico has the potential to become one of the world's aquaculture superpowers," says McKee.

From introductions and discussions at "Harvesting the Sea," efforts have begun by the state of Jalisco and TAMU-CC to develop a cooperative relationship and create the mutual exchange and development of new aquaculture technologies.

Other sponsors of the event were the Port of Corpus Christi, Central Power and Light Co., Mercantile Bank, Corpus Christi Trade Center, Water Street Seafood Company and the Coastal Bend Restaurant Association.

TAMU-CC grad with marines near Bosnia-Herzegovina

Marine Major William L. Munck, a Texas A&M University-Corpus Christi graduate with an MBA degree, has been serving off the coast of Bosnia-Herzegovina with the 22nd Marine Expeditionary Unit of the USS Nassau Amphibious Ready Group.

Munck is one of nearly 2,000 marines and 1,600 sailors who were ordered to the coast of Bosnia as a cautionary measure in light of recent developments. U.S. naval forces have maintained a continuous presence in the Adriatic Sea in support of United Nations operations there since 1992.

Munck and the 22nd MEU left the U.S. in late October for a six-month overseas deployment with the USS Nassau, USS Gunston Hall and USS Ponce.

He joined the Marine Corps in June 1980.

Fellowships available to future history teachers

The James Madison Memorial Fellowship Foundation, a federally-endowed program designed to strengthen instruction about the Constitution in the nation's schools, will award generous fellowships for master's degree level graduate study in the framing and history of the U.S. Constitution. College seniors and college graduates who intend to become secondary school teachers of American history, American government and social studies are eligible for awards.

Through nationwide competition, James Madison Fellowships will be awarded to at least one legal resident of each state, the District of Colum-

bia, Puerto Rico and other U.S. territories. After completing study under the fellowships, James Madison Fellows are required to teach American history, American government or social studies in grades 7-12 for a minimum of one year for each year of graduate assistance they receive.

Fellowships carry a maximum stipend of \$24,000 for up to two years of full-time study for college graduates, which can be used to cover the costs of tuition, fees, books, room and board. Fellows may enroll in graduate programs leading to master's degrees in American history, political science
